The Power of Community: Saving Pleasant Valley Preserve

Along a five-mile stretch of Pleasant Valley Road in the hamlet of Cedarvale sits a 304-acre mixed wetland and woodland preserve owned by the Central New York Land Trust (CNYLT) that is open to the public for hiking and enjoying nature at its most pristine.

The area is rich with streams, ponds, fields, an upland forest and open and wooded wetlands that are home to many species of birds and wildlife. It includes four miles of easy to moderate hiking trails and a parking area off Pleasant Valley Road.

The land was once part of Karl and Mary Wiles' family farm where they grew Christmas trees, tapped the countless maples for their Cedarvale Maple Syrup brand, leased acreage to farmers and gave friends access to the land for quiet walks. So, when the Wiles decided to retire and sell their land in 2018, neighbors

sprang to action to save the area from development and keep it forever natural.





If it were not for the incredible efforts of local residents, Diana Green, Harry Nusbaum and Barb Root, the Pleasant Valley Preserve might be just another housing tract today. Instead, they contacted the CNYLT in hopes the organization could purchase and save the land. CNYLT was not in an immediate position to do so, therefore the trio countered an existing purchase offer on the land and held the mortgage for CNYLT while a fundraising campaign was undertaken. In 2022, after three years of fundraising, the \$273,000 goal was reached to allow for the land purchase and additional funds were raised to enhance the property.

A significant contribution from Kathy and Steve Schwab was instrumental in the fundraising along with donations from 200+ other individuals, the Onondaga Cycling Club, Onondaga Audubon and other sources.

Pleasant Valley Preserve had the added benefit of providing the link to other CNYLT properties - donated by the Lockwood family – that did not previously have road access. In recent years, CNYLT obtained funding from the Onondaga Environmental Institute to install a bridge over the wetland to allow for safe aquatic animal passage and reduce human impact on the wetland ecosystem. And, since 2022 the Trust has been returning the former farmland to native wildflower meadows.

Town Councilor Mary Ryan is a member of CNYLT's fundraising committee and a passionate advocate for the mission of the


organization. She explained that the organization is dedicated to preserving the natural beauty of Central New York's unique landscapes. Over the years, its efforts have expanded to include environmental education and sustainable practices with a focus on enhancing water quality, restoring

habitats, and creating green space.

"Pleasant Valley Preserve in all its unspoiled beauty is an incredible asset for our community. We owe the Town residents who spearheaded the campaign to save it a forever debt of gratitude. It's incredible what can be accomplished when landowners, neighbors, the land trust and public work together," Ryan said.

"We encourage residents to check out the Preserve if they haven't already. Please be sure to stay on the path and follow all rules to ensure the habitats remain protected," she added.

News From the Highway Department

The Highway Department is shifting gears into Spring, putting away the plows and preparing for another season of road repairs, drainage work, mowing roadsides, sweeping roads, and of course brush and yard waste pickup. Brush & Yard Waste Pickup

- · April 1 through October 31 weather permitting and subject to change
- · Average 2 pick-ups a month, but not a scheduled service
- · Brush and yard waste is the "woody" natural material from your property including cut pieces of trees, limbs, shrubbery, grass, yard, and garden waste.
- · Grass clippings and leaves must be in brown paper bags or boxes. No plastic bags or loose material will be picked up.
- · Do not place materials under wires, tree branches or in the road.
- Pieces of trees and brush must be piled neatly near the road with nothing larger than 8-feet-long and 6-inches-in-diameter.
- No lot clearing or waste produced by commercial contractors, such as tree stumps, large tree branches, trunks, landscaping waste, rocks, sod, dirt or other construction and landscaper waste is acceptable. Commercial contractors are responsible for disposal of these.

If you need assistance with removal of these items or have yard waste and brush remaining after pickup has ended, OCRRA has drop off sites available for a fee. Call them at 315-453-2866 or go to ocrra.org.

Earth Day Dropoff

Once again, the Town will be participating in OCRRA's Earth Day Cleanup as a drop-off location for residents to bring their stickered bags and other items. Our volunteers will be available to unload your items for disposal.

John and his fellow Superintendents wore their trademark orange safety shirts at a press conference afterward to share their agenda with the media.

Southwood Park Progress

The path to a new park in Southwood is paved with state government red tape. But thanks to the group effort of Town Councilor Lisa Goodwin, Jamesville-Dewitt School Superintendent Dr. Peter Smith and our State elected representatives, legislation has been drafted and is moving forward in the NYS Assembly and Senate that will allow the Town to lease property in Southwood from the school district for the park.

Why is that necessary? New York State requires municipalities to own the property where a park district will be formed. The land the Town has identified as the best site for the project is owned by the School District so an amendment to current law is needed. The bill (A3949/S5557) has been introduced in both houses of the Legislature and once passed, the Town can create a park district and start building the park! We hope to have good news to report back to the residents of Southwood before this legislative session closes.



Program Extended to Benefit Longest Serving Volunteer Firefighters

BIG thanks to Frank Valls, President, Howlett Hill Fire Department, who championed a Proposition to extend the Length of Service Award Program – administered by the Town and established for active local volunteer firefighters – from 40 to 50 years of service, effective January 1, 2025. The Proposition was approved by a 97.3% margin. Annual costs of the amended program will not increase despite the change, thereby not impacting taxpayers. Frank brought the issue to the Town Board last year in time for the Board to adopt a program amendment; secure an official vote date from the Board of Elections; make all of the required public notifications; and hold the public vote necessary for its adoption. Thanks to Frank's diligence, the Town has the distinction of being the only known Town in the area that has approved the extension on behalf of our volunteer fire departments' longest serving members.

The Best Little Grocery Store in America Turns 90

The Town Board recently celebrated Green Hills Farms' big anniversary with a special proclamation honoring its important place in the history and hearts of our Town and thanking the Hawkins and Turner families for always putting service, quality and community at the forefront. From its humble roots as a farm stand to employing 200+ and being named the "best little grocery store in America", Green Hills is and will always be central to the fabric of our community.

Fun Fact: Town Supervisor Mahar started bagging groceries at Green Hills when he was 16 and worked his way up to Director of Operations.

State Grants Secured to Boost Town's Clean-Energy Efforts

Town Councilors have been working with the Central New York Regional Planning and Development Board on a variety of initiatives to advance clean energy usage locally. After some initial energy education, training, and benchmarking, we've tackled LED streetlight conversion throughout the Town and are in the midst of several energy studies. These projects were instrumental in helping us receive a grant from the New York State Energy Research Development Authority to convert all lighting at Town Hall to LED lighting. This will prove a cost-savings to taxpayers as well as provide environmental benefits.

Our Town Supervisor meets regularly with the commander of the Onondaga County Sheriff's Dept. located at Town Hall to get updates on their efforts to combat crime in the Town but law enforcement is not our role. Final Resting Places of Local Heroes

Onondaga County Veterans Cemetery

On May 30, 1987, the Onondaga County Veterans Memorial Cemetery - located on Howlett Hill Road here in the Town - was formally dedicated and today honors Onondaga County residents and family members who dedicated portions of their lives to the military and defense of our nation.

Since the first burial of decorated World War II Navy veteran Leo McInerney

on June 11, 1986, the cemetery has performed services for more than 5,000 service members from the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, and Air Force, including visionary Onondaga County legislators Jack Haley and Jim Salanger, as well as legendary paratrooper/Syracuse University football coach Ben Schwartzwalder.

All veterans buried in the Veterans Cemetery were honorably discharged from military service and were residents of Onondaga County for at least five years. More than 8,630 Veterans and their spouses are buried there.

Among those are the parents of Town Supervisor John P. Mahar and Town Clerk Janet Christopherson Hillery. John A. Mahar served in the Navy during the Korean War and is buried alongside his wife, Mary Ellen. Warren Christopherson served in the Navy during World War II and is buried next to his wife, Vivian.

The 52-acre Veterans Cemetery grounds have been improved and expanded over the years to include the renovated Gordie Lane Memorial Chapel in 2021 and additional acreage to ensure a fitting final resting place for veterans today and those who will serve in the future. The Chapel's namesake is lifelong area resident Gordon "Gordie" Lane (1948-2021), who served in the Marine Corps in Vietnam. He dedicated his life to serving the veteran community and was a well-respected advocate for veteran wellness, earning many honors for his leadership and veteran advocacy.

Each year, in preparation for Memorial Day, Town officials join volunteers from around the County in getting the cemetery ready for Memorial Day activities. Local residents interested in helping have several opportunities:

- · 10 a.m., May 2: Veteran's Cemetery Spring Cleanup
- · 9 a.m., May 27: Memorial Day Flag Removal
- · 1 p.m., May 23: Memorial Day Flag Placement
- · 10 a.m., Sunday, May 25: Memorial Day Ceremony

Every evening at 6 p.m., nearby Howlett Hill neighbors can hear Taps played in the cemetery as a daily call to remember and honor those who served.

Did You Know... West Genesee grad and town resident, Colleen McInerney, designed the Town's new logo. She is the granddaughter of the first Veteran buried in the County Veterans Cemetery.

Other Final Resting Places of Local Veterans


There are several other sites in the Town where local veterans find their final resting place. Patriot Burial Signs, which signify the graves of Revolutionary War soldiers include Walnut Grove, South Onondaga, Howlett Hill and Pine Ridge cemeteries..

Walnut Grove Cemetery is the burial place of many veterans of the Revolutionary War through Vietnam. Town Councilor Lisa Goodwin and her family and friends place flags at Veterans' graves there every year in advance of Memorial Day.

Pioneer Cemetery in Sentinel Heights has a roadside marker that notes Revolutionary War soldier, Andrew Share, is buried there.

The General Ellis Cemetery is located on property owned by Onondaga Community College, across from Mulroy Hall on Onondaga Road. This small family cemetery includes the grave of General John Ellis, who served in both the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812.

Likewise, there are a number of smaller cemeteries where veterans of the armed forces are buried including the Cedarvale (Kinyon) and Gilbert/Pleasant Valley Road cemeteries as well as a few remaining family cemeteries that were parts of farms in the 1800s. Loomis Hill Cemetery next to the Veterans Cemetery is the final resting place of many who spent years living at the Poorhouse or Onondaga County





Home and Hospital. Because many died without families, there is a high probability there are veterans buried there as well.


We hope the following information helps residents stay in compliance with applicable codes, rules and regulations.

Zoning Code Compliance Info for Property Owners: Swimming Pools and Accessory Structures


Accessory Structure Location & Setback

The Town's Zoning Code provides standards that apply to sheds, garages and other buildings that are detached as well as to swimming pools. Detached sheds, garages and other buildings - no matter how large or small - are defined as "accessory structures" in the Zoning Code. All accessory structures are subject to the location and setback requirements set forth in the Town's Zoning Code based on the zoning district where your property is located.

Such structures of all sizes must be in your rear yard, as defined by the zoning ordinance, and cannot be closer to your rear lot line than a distance



For example, a shed on a lot that is 100-feet-wide and is located in an R-1 Zoning District would require the setback from the rear property line to be 10 feet and a setback from the side lot line of 20 feet because the side yard setback in an R-1 zoning district is 20 feet on each side. Consult the Zoning Code or the Codes Enforcement Office if you have questions about the setback requirements in your zoning district.



All accessory structures including, but not limited to, tool and storage sheds and playhouses in excess of 144-square-feet also require issuance of a building permit - which means compliance with the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code, in addition to the Zoning Code. This is not a new requirement. Check to see if your accessory structure is in compliance with these requirements.

Swimming Pool Barrier and Access Requirements

There are special requirements on the State and local levels for swimming pools. The New York State Residential Code defines a "swimming pool" as any structure or basin that contains water more than 24 inches deep at any point. This includes above and inground pools, hot tubs, spas, and wading pools. There is a requirement for a barrier around any swimming pool, spa or hot tub to prevent against potential drowning by preventing access to such facilities by persons outside the property, persons within the dwelling and persons in other parts of the property not contained within the pool enclosure.

Pools require a barrier that is at least 48 inches in height above grade on the side which faces away from the swimming pool. A fence is a form of barrier. If the barrier includes a gate, the type of gate must be both self-closing and self- latching. If the wall of a house is one side or a part of the barrier, all doors with direct access to a pool must be equipped with an audible alarm that meets the State standards. Operable windows in the walls of such barrier must have latching devices and not be able to open more than four inches. Applicants are encouraged to contact the Codes Office for specific requirements about barrier requirements.

The barrier requirements also apply to above ground pools. When an above ground pool structure itself is used as a barrier, it must be at least 48 inches above the level of grade or supplemented by an additional barrier mounted on top of the pool structure. Alternately, an above ground pool may be surrounded by a barrier which meets the requirements of the building code. Any ladder or steps must be able to be secured, locked or removed to prevent access or the ladder or steps must be surrounded by an appropriate barrier.

An outdoor pool must be surrounded by a temporary barrier at least 48 inches above grade during construction and installation for no more than 90 days and replaced by a permanent barrier.

All swimming pools, other than hot tubs or spas with a safety cover, must be equipped with a pool alarm capable of detecting entry into the water at any point on the surface. A pool with an attached spa at a different water level would require an alarm at each level.

A swimming pool requires issuance of a building permit which requires construction and electrical inspections to be conducted and requires issuance of a certificate confirming compliance with these code requirements.

From a Zoning Code perspective, a swimming pool must be located in your rear yard, and the pool, together with any pool wall, walkway or related equipment cannot be located any closer to the rear lot line than a distance equal to 10 percent of the required lot width in the zoning district in which it is located - or actual lot width, whichever is greater, and no closer to your side lot line than the main building side yard width. For example, in an R-1 One Family Residential District where the side yard setback is a minimum of 20 feet on each side, and the actual house is set back at 23 feet from the side lot line, the pool and all walls, walkways and equipment must be set back at least 23 feet along the entire side lot line.

Compliance Responsibility

The Town Codes Enforcement Office is available to explain and to help you understand all these requirements and to assist you in obtaining and processing necessary permits. Please do not rely solely upon the advice of your contractor or installer to determine zoning compliance. The property owner is ultimately responsible for assuring compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

From Richard McCarron, 11th District, Onondaga County Legislator

I hope you are all well after the snowy and cold winter we had and that, like me, you can't wait to be outside this spring and summer. I'm looking forward to using my smoker and enjoying some great food on the deck!



SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

In the past few months, the Legislature has passed several very important items that could directly impact you. One is a new local law which would allow for the installation of stop-arm cameras on school buses in participating districts and fine those who pass when the red lights are flashing, and the stop-arm is extended. The County will now partner with an outside company to administer the program which has been successful in other parts of the country. It's my hope that since the money is coming from traffic safety, or lack of it if you will, it only seems appropriate to reinvest it in that.

EMS COMPREHENSIVE STUDY

The Legislature also authorized the use of \$200,000 in previously approved money for a comprehensive study of emergency medical services in Onondaga County. We'd like to address some of the current challenges with EMS in our County and this study will examine everything from the 911 dispatch to the transfer to hospital care. Some of you may have experienced long wait times for care and that is not acceptable. Our goal with this study is to include all local providers and fire departments to figure out what's working and what's not. I'm looking forward to seeing the results in about one year and then hopefully implementing some of the recommendations.

MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT FOR SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Both of those items initially came through the Legislature's Public Safety Committee, of which I am proud to continue as Vice Chair for 2025. Another recently advanced resolution, which was later approved by the full Legislature, allows the county to accept state grant funding to support a new mental health initiative for the Onondaga County Sheriff's Office. Having served with them for over 20 years, I know first-hand the stresses and emotional battles experienced by our emergency responders, and last April's tragedy only added to them. It is fantastic that we are now able to provide them with an additional resource to help them deal with some of the things they see and go through every day.

We all know that our first responders are a critical part of our communities. Over the past few months, I was honored to emcee nearly a dozen fire department banquets all across Onondaga County, including Onondaga Hill, Taunton and Nedrow. I also had the honor of speaking at the Onondaga County Fire Chiefs Association's annual banquet. We owe a debt of gratitude to these fine men and women who put their personal lives aside to help us during our time of need, so please join me in publicly thanking them!





ONONDAGA COMMUNITY COLLEGE

I've said it before – we are so lucky that the campus of Onondaga Community College is located in our 11th District. They recently released their 2024 Report to the Community and one thing that stands out to me is that the new Micron-related Electromechanical Technology degree program doubled in capacity and enrollment last year. This shows that Onondaga County's investments are having an impact, and by working together, the County and OCC are providing our students with the programs they desire to train them for the high-tech jobs of tomorrow. I look forward to Dr. Hilton presenting OCC's budget to the Legislature in May and promise to continue supporting this great institution.

REGIONAL MARKET

From Judge Patrick M. Kilmartin, Town Justice Department

The Town of Onondaga administers its Justice Court pursuant to the New York State Constitution and other applicable New York State statues. Two Town Justices are elected within the Town to administer civil and criminal matters that might come before the Court. I serve as one of the Town Justices, along with Judge Paul Mullin. Court proceedings are generally held by the Town Justices on a weekly basis.

The civil matters that come before our court include landlord tenant matters and small claims matters. The landlord tenant matters typically relate to rent disputes and habitability of rental properties disputes involving landlords within the Town and those renters that reside within the Town. Small claim matters most often include contractual disputes where the disputed matter is \$3,000 or less.

The criminal matters that come before the court most often involve misdemeanor matters, where the maximum allowable sentence could involve no more than one year in jail, and traffic matters. The most typical criminal matters involve petit larceny, assault, domestic violence, and criminal contempt charges - alleging a violation of an order of protection.

The most typical traffic matters involve speeding and other customary traffic matters, but also Driving While Intoxicated misdemeanor charges. The non-DWI related traffic matters are often much less serious than other criminal charges.

In addition, throughout the year, the Town judges conduct preliminary hearings wherein felony charges are brought before the Court. In such cases, the Town judges hear evidence from prosecutors and defense attorneys and render decisions on whether or not sufficient evidence exists to hold in jail those that are charged with felony matters (those more serious criminal charges that could involve a sentence to jail in excess of one year). These felony charges often involve serious assault, robbery, burglary and the most serious domestic violence charges.

The Town of Onondaga website (townofonondaga.gov) provides detailed information about: the Court schedule; contact information for Court Clerks; links to the Department of Motor Vehicles regarding points, fine information, and license suspension, as well as a link to District Attorney's Office traffic portal to allow those charged with traffic matters to seek a traffic charge reduction to resolve traffic matters via the mail, instead of repeatedly appearing at Court.

Veterans

Every year in time for Memorial Day, the Clerk's office orders and distributes American flags for placement at the graves of Veterans at the Pine Ridge, Walnut Grove, Howlett Hill and South Onondaga cemeteries. It is a tradition the Town of Onondaga is honored to uphold. This is in addition to the many flags provided by the County for the Onondaga County Veteran's Cemetery on Howlett Hill Road, in which many of us have taken part in flag placement each Memorial Day. Also, remember that honorably discharged military Veterans residing in Onondaga County can obtain a FAVOR (Find and Assist Veterans of Record) card by bringing their discharge or DD-214 papers, along with photo ID, to the Town Clerk's office. FAVOR cards qualify you for discounts throughout Onondaga County. For a list of participating merchants, stop into the Town Clerk's office or visit ongov.net/favor. Please spread the word to any area businesses you think would like to participate in this program. Merchant applications can be picked up here at the Town Clerk's office.

Conservation Licenses - Update

In August 2024, the DEC moved away from the State-issued Valeron paper and now offers the following options for obtaining your license:

- 1) Purchase the license directly through the DEC, either online at **dec.ny.gov** or by calling **866-933-2257**. They will be e-mailed to you for immediate use. If you choose to have the license mailed to you, there is a two dollar printing and mailing fee. You can also utilize the **DEC app HuntFishNY**, for electronic proof of licensure, or by providing your 12-digit DEC ID number.
- 2) Purchase the license at a License Issuing Agent location, such as our **Town Clerk's office**. If you choose to have our office print the license, there will be a print fee of one dollar. This fee can be avoided by having our office e-mail the license to you to print at home. Our 2025 Hunting & Fishing Guides should be arriving soon, or you can visit dec. ny.gov for the latest hunting and fishing information and regulations.

Peddlers/Solicitors

The Town of Onondaga requires a permit allowing solicitors to go door to door. This entails a background check for a fee of \$25/peddler, and the Peddler Permit fee of \$100/peddler. They are instructed to have this permit with them and should be able to produce this on demand, as well as have their Company ID visible. If you have any

concerns about a peddler's legitimacy or have questions, please contact the Town Clerk's office. If a solicitor approaches your residence and you fear for your safety, call 911.

Handicapped Parking Permits

Handicapped hangtags/parking permits can be obtained for **Town of Onondaga residents** by providing our office with the completed NY State application signed by you and your doctor. Applications can be obtained from your doctor's office, through the link on our website, or here at the Town Clerk's office. You will also need to provide your driver's license or a state-issued ID when applying.

Dog Licensing

If you own a dog in the Town of Onondaga, please remember that it is a requirement to get them licensed. Dog license applications can be obtained from our office or by visiting our website at townofonondaga.gov. Please provide Rabies and spay/neuter documentation, as well as the yearly fee of \$10 for spayed/neutered and \$20 for non-spayed/neutered. You can license your dog for up to three years at a time – depending on vaccination status. Please visit ongov.net/health/env for upcoming Rabies clinics. The Town of Onondaga contracts with the SPCA to field reports of all lost, found or stray dogs, and can be reached by calling 315-454-0928.

FOIL Requests

The Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) provides citizens the right to examine records maintained by government agencies, with certain exceptions. To examine records held at the Town Clerk's office, please complete a FOIL request form, available at the Town Clerk's office or via the FOIL Request link on the Town Clerk's page at townofonondaga.gov.

Board of Elections

Please mark your calendars for the following important elections: **Primary Election – 6/24/25**; **General Election – 11/4/25**. Other important information including registration deadlines can be found by visiting ongov.net/elections, or by calling 315-435-VOTE. Voter Registration Forms are available in the Town Clerk's Office or through the Onondaga County Board of Elections located at 1000 Erie Blvd. West.

U.S. Passports

Passport renewals can now be done **online** for eligible U.S. citizens by visiting **travel. state.gov**. As always, applying for a *new* passport can be done here at the Town Clerk's office. An appointment is required for all new passports and can be made by calling our office at 315-469-1583.

Grants for Equipment Improvements

The Southwood Volunteer Fire Department was approved for two grants in 2024. One from FEMA which allowed us to replace our aging AEDs and purchase a LUCAS device.

The LUCAS device, which is an automatic compression device utilized during CPR, allows for excellent, prolonged chest compressions when CPR is needed. Our second grant approved was from NYS and will allow us to replace aging Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) worn by our volunteers. This grant is for 15 sets of PPE to be purchased over a five-year period. This will allow us to replace those sets to ensure we are in compliance with OSHA without having to purchase all 15 sets at one time.


Annual Mother's Day Chicken BBQ Take-out Dinner



PARKS & RECREATION PROGRAM REGISTRATION INFORMATION

REGISTRATION IS ON A FIRST COME, FIRST SERVE BASIS.

- · Non-residents pay \$10 more for most programs.
- · Registration is online at parks.townofonondaga.gov
- · We have a drop box in the rear of the building/office on East Ave.
- Registration deadline (unless otherwise specified) for all programs is one week before the program begins. A late fee of \$10 will be added to the program fee when registering after the deadline.
- Don't wait for deadlines. Program may be canceled if the minimum is not reached.
- It is the intention of the Town that no youth be denied the ability to participate in programs because of an inability to pay. Partial scholarships are available for youth programs to eligible families.
- · Parking and entrances on both Velasko Road and East Avenue.
- Now accepting major credit cards. A 2.65% (\$3 min.) convenience fee is added to each credit card transaction. **This fee is non-refundable**, even if the program is cancelled by the department.

· If paying in person or by mail, make checks payable to Town of Onondaga. An online account must be created even if you choose not to pay online.

REFUND & CANCELLATION POLICIES

REFUND/CREDIT POLICY

Please use care when selecting classes. A 100% refund (excluding the convenience fee for registration when using a charge card) will be made when a class is canceled by the Recreation Department. Refunds or account credit will be made up to a week before the program begins. Credit will be added to your account in full, but a \$5 administration fee will be deducted for refunds. If the refund is under \$25, the refund will automatically be a credit to your account. A \$20 fee will be charged for returned checks.

CANCELLATION POLICY

In case of cancellation due to weather or other unavoidable problem, every effort will be made to contact participants. However, sometimes this is impossible. Ensure you are opted-in to receive our texts and email blasts. If you are in question as to whether a class may be canceled, call the Recreation Office at 315-469-3464 or check our website or Facebook Page.

Park Facilities

The Town operates four beautiful parks for residents. Please be aware that dogs are not allowed in our parks. Smoking of any materials is also prohibited. Reservations for courts, fields, and pavilions require a permit and are available at the Parks office or online at parks.townofonondaga.gov. Permit forms have a list of all fees and rules. Permits must be submitted AT LEAST one week in advance, and no refunds will be issued for inclement weather. Groups of 15 or more MUST have a permit. Parks are closed November 1 through April 30.

Kelley Brothers Memorial Park – 99 Kelley Park Dr., Nedrow, NY 13205

This 15-acre park has a rentable pavilion with an accessible walkway and grills. The park has a restroom, play areas, tennis court, basketball court, and a beach volleyball court. There is a pavilion (not rentable) near the playground to provide shade and picnic seating for families that utilize the play areas on a regular basis. The maximum occupancy for permits is 75.

King Memorial Park - 4030 Split Rock Road, Camillus, NY 13031

The athletic fields are reserved for our adult softball leagues during the week, with WOYSA playing games on Saturdays in the Spring and Fall. This 20-acre park has two softball fields, a beach volleyball court, two tennis courts, a basketball court, two pickleball courts, grills, 2 pavilions, playground equipment, and restrooms. The small pavilion near the playground provides shade and picnic seating for the families that utilize the play areas. The bigger pavilion in the front of the park is rentable. The maximum occupancy for permits is 100.

Howlett Hill Park - 5051 Youth Center Road, Camillus, NY 13031

Adult softball games are held weeknights and WOYSA holds soccer games on Saturdays in the spring and fall. This 9-acre park has two softball fields, one tennis court, one basketball court, a pavilion, grills, playground equipment, and restrooms. The maximum occupancy for permits is 75.

Anthony J. Santaro Memorial Park - 4979 Velasko Road, Syracuse, NY 13215

This 22-acre park is a home site for WOYSA, Blue Wave & Outlaws Lacrosse, Westhill and Onondaga Community College athletic teams. There is a playground for children aged 2-5, as well as a play area for older children. The blue shelter, adjacent to the play areas provides shade and picnic seating and is open to all. It is not reserved for groups - **only the upper pavilion** is available by permit. Two large grills are adjacent to the upper pavilion. The park also has pickleball courts, tennis courts, a tennis/pickleball wall, and a basketball court. Tikes 'n Bikes Santaro Town provides a safe, fenced-in area for in-line skating and children with big wheel-type riders, tricycles, and small bikes with training wheels. The maximum occupancy for permits is 150.

PARK SECURITY

Our Town parks are patrolled by our staff and the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department and covered by security cameras. Unfortunately, we have seen a rise in vandalism, litter, unsupervised children in restrooms, and improper use of park property, which causes additional time and money spent on repairs and can lead to sudden cancellation of activities including park permits. We need your help to keep the Town of Onondaga Parks beautiful. Please call 911 to report any suspicious activity. All reports are anonymous. Park ordinances are strictly enforced with appearance tickets.

Patridge Family Collection

The indenture, pictured here, from 210 years ago, bound Amanda Stevens to Williams Partridge. Partridge was a lawyer, farmer, and served as Commissioner of both Highways and Schools. His home was on Makyes Road, near today's Fawn Hill development.

A few years ago, the Town of Onondaga Historical Society (TOHS) received a large box of documents that pertained to the activities of the Patridge family when they lived on Onondaga Hill. It includes land deeds and mortgages, receipts, letters to and from family, and numerous essays written by James Albert Partridge when he was a student in the early 1830s at Onondaga Academy in the Valley. Likewise, a number of Partridge family members are buried in Walnut Grove Cemetery on South Ave.

Collection Digitized, Available Online

TOHS extends our gratitude to the Central New York Library Resources Council (CNYLRC) and to Ashley Beavers for assistance in guiding the TOHS through the digitization process of the Partridge Family Collection for placement on nyheritage.org.

Also, thank you to Onondaga Free Library for making this connection to the CNYLRC possible.

New York Heritage Digital Collections (nyheritage.org) include over 400,000 digitized books, manuscripts, maps, letters, photographs, and memorabilia. New York Heritage gives access to big stories and small affairs spanning the history of New York. It includes contributions from over 430 libraries, museums, archives, and other community organizations.


