

employees of our Town departments every day. And while the day-to-day operations keep us all very busy, our role in continually evaluating the enduring needs of the nine very diverse hamlets of our Town is equally important.

Over the past several months, a special task force has been working on an updated Town of Onondaga Master Plan to guide development in our Town for the next decade-plus. The group is comprised of experts in zoning, planning, land use, public safety, engineering, preservation, recreation, and other essential areas. It also includes representation from residents and business owners in each area of the Town. When completed this Fall, the plan will be posted to the Town's website and a link will be provided on our Facebook and Instagram pages.

A Master Plan though, is only as meaningful as the Town leadership's follow-through to its parameters via a variety of checks and balances. That is where our Town Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning Board and Building and Codes Department come in. For the past several months, a significant amount of effort has been put into assembling a team of credentialed, experienced and relationship-focused professionals who not only know and understand our Town but are well-versed in the intricacies of code enforcement, land use, site plan review and construction management. With the appointment of Jeff Herrick as Building & Codes Director, and his new staff, we are confident we have a strong team in place to best serve the public. I would like to give a big shout out to Ron Ryan, the Town's former Code Enforcement Officer. He gave generously of his time and limitless knowledge to get us to this point. Ron knows this Town like few others ever have or ever will and has achieved a level of expertise in his field

that is second to none. To say we are fortunate to have his assistance is an understatement. You can read more about our Codes Department team in this issue.

Another significant milestone with long-lasting effects was achieved this summer as we successfully negotiated and finalized a 20-year lease agreement with the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department to keep its South Station at Town Hall. The new contract ensures a police presence in our Town for the foreseeable future - which is invaluable for public safety.

And finally, we are excited to partner with the Nedrow Fire Department and its Auxiliary and Nedrow Community Crew on a

community banner project to honor Town veterans and feature local businesses. The banners, which were designed by a local artist, will be hung along a portion of South Salina Street and Rockwell Road and available for purchase through the Auxiliary. Details on participating will be posted on Facebook.



News From the Town Highway Department

Your Highway Department has been hard at work for residents. Here is a sample of what we've been up to this summer:

- · 1,050 Loads of brush and yard waste have been picked up so far this year, and we expect this to double by the end of the year.
- · 103 Yards of concrete have been poured to repair or replace catch basins and gutters.
- 9.38 Miles of Town roads have been oiled and stoned, cap sealed or blacktopped so far Highway Superintendent with more scheduled before the season ends.



- · 260 Feet of pipe has been installed for culverts/drainage issues.
- · Many faded stop signs have been replaced, street signs and speed signs repaired/replaced.
- · Roadside mowing, first cut completed to help with line-of-site issues, and the second cut continues through the fall. All retention basins have been moved for the season.
- · And so much more, while responding to downed trees and flooding issues caused by the frequent storms.

Up next, we are getting ready for our seven-week-long Annual Fall Cleanup. Check the schedule for your pickup week and details on what we will and will not pick up. Flyers were also mailed to all residents.

2025 FALL CLEANUP SCHEDULE

It's time to discard your unwanted items (junk) from your home, yard, shed, garage, & basement.

Our crew and trucks cover over 200 miles of road during the 7-week Town Cleanup event. Please look at your schedule carefully and have your junk and yard waste out on the roadside prior to the start of your week. We will only pick up once for junk and once for yard waste during your week, we can not come back as it takes us the entire week to complete each fire district.

Examples of acceptable items: Sofa, chairs, box spring, washer, dryer, toys, scrap wood, plumbing fixtures, lawn furniture, grill, carpeting, dry empty paint cans without lid. Glass items like windows and mirrors, but please tape or wrap in plastic to avoid them from shattering.

Brush: MUST be piled separately from Junk and will be picked up during your scheduled Fall Cleanup week. Branches must be 6 inches in diameter or less and no more than 8 feet in length. Please stack neatly away from fences, power poles and low wires.

Leaves & Yard Waste: MUST be in paper leaf bags or cardboard boxes. No plastic bags will be picked up as they are not biodegradable and cannot be composted. No stones, dirt or trash of any kind in bags please.

Please Note: Brush and yard waste will not be picked up again until after all 7 fire districts are completed. OCRRA'S Amboy and Jamesville compost sites are open for residents to take yard waste if you need to dispose of sooner. Call for more information.

ITEMS WE will not PICKUP

- Recyclables of any kind, plastic & glass bottles, papers, newspapers, magazines and cardboard.
- Mattress
- Tires & Batteries
- · Barrels of any kind
- Gas & Propane tanks
- Tree stumps & Rocks
- Freezers, Refrigerators, Dehumidifiers
- Toxic containers, medical supplies or waste
- · Lawn Chemicals
- Asbestos, Shingles, Pipe wrap

- Concrete and Construction Material
- Paint cans with contents & lid on.
- TV's, Computers, Microwaves, Air Conditioners, or Electronics of any kind.

Marriage Certificates

We have seen an increase in the number of marriage transcript requests, mostly due to the Real ID mandate. Please remember that transcripts can only be found at the Clerk's office where you applied for the license, or through the Department of Vital Records in Albany.

U.S. Passports

Passport renewals can now be done online. As always, first-time applicants can submit their application through our office. Please remember to bring a photo from an accepted passport photo processing facility, along with your original birth certificate and state-issued ID. For more information on this and other commonly asked questions, please feel free to call our office or visit Travel.state.gov.

Conservation Licenses

The DEC is encouraging the use of their mobile app, HuntFishNY, or their website, dec.ny.gov to obtain your sporting license. We are happy to assist you here at the Town Clerk's office, but please remember we must charge a \$1 print fee if you would like us to print your license. Doe permits can be purchased from 8/1 – 10/1 by visiting the DEC website, by calling the DEC at 1-866-933-2257, or right here at the Town Clerk's office.

Peddlers/Solicitors

The Town of Onondaga requires a permit for door-to-door sales, which entails a background check and applicable fees before a permit is issued. The solicitor must have company ID and be able to produce the Town issued license upon demand. Please call our office if you have questions about the solicitor's legitimacy. We also post the approved solicitors to our Town Facebook page.

Veterans Return the Favor Cards

Honorably discharged military Veterans residing in Onondaga County can obtain a FAVOR card by bringing their discharge or DD-214 papers, along with photo ID to the Town Clerk's office. FAVOR cards qualify you for discounts throughout Onondaga County. For a list of participating merchants, stop into the Town Clerk's office or visit onondaga.gov/ clerk/favor. It's one small way to show our appreciation to the many Veterans throughout our community, and it is an honor to meet those that come through our doors!

Please provide Rabies and spay/neuter documentation, as well as the yearly fee of \$10 for spayed/neutered and \$20 for non-spayed/neutered. Fire Hazard: Grass & Weed Height

Please be reminded that the Town Code requires all premises and immediate exterior property to be maintained free from any brush, grass, weed or plant growth in excess of 10 inches (254 millimeters). Overgrown vegetation not only looks unkempt but may also pose a fire hazard, especially during dry summer months. Let's keep our neighborhoods safe!

Accessory Structure Zoning Setbacks: Side & Rear Yard Requirements

Below are the setback requirements for various residential zoning districts (R1, R2, R3, RC):

◆ Side Yard Setbacks

R1 District: 20 ft. from each side lot line; one story structures may have a reduced set back of 15 ft.

R2 District: 10 ft. from each side lot line; one story structures may have a reduced setback of 7.5 ft.

R3 District: 7.5 ft. from each side lot line; one story structures may have a reduced setback of 5.6 ft.

RC District: 20 ft. from each side lot line; one story structures may have a reduced setback of 15 ft.

◆ Rear Yard Setbacks

For all R1, R2, R3 and RC districts, structures must be set back from the rear lot line by at least 10% of the lot width.

Tax Exemption Renewals

Exemption renewal notices will be mailed in early September with a return deadline of March 1, 2026. Renewal forms will be sent to residents currently receiving the following exemptions: Senior Low Income, Disability and Limited Income, Clergy Members and Non-Profit Organizations, Agricultural Properties, and Volunteer Fire/Ambulance Workers.

Simplifying the STAR program and STAR forms

The 2025-2026 Enacted State Budget included several provisions to simplify the STAR program.

Homeowners will no longer be required to submit an application to the assessor if they had an ownership change or if they aged into the Enhanced STAR exemption. ORPTS will notify assessors of Basic STAR recipients who become eligible for Enhanced STAR (rather than requiring seniors to apply to their assessors).

After the last 2025 taxable status date at the end of this month, the following STAR exemption forms will be removed from our website:

- · Form RP-425-B, Application for Basic STAR Exemption
- · Form RP-425-E, Application for Enhanced STAR Exemption
- · Form RP-425-IVP, Supplement to Form RP-425-E

Property owners who have a change of ownership will report it to the Tax Department using the Homeowner Benefit Portal. If they don't have internet access, they can call our representatives.

STAR exemptions and Veteran's exemptions DO NOT need to be renewed annually. They renew automatically!

Coming soon to Taunton: The Clerk's House!

This September will see the opening of The Clerk's House, a specialty bakery at 4221 Fay Rd., Taunton. The shop is located in the newly renovated building at the rear of the Cider Mill restaurant property and owned by Dan and Teresa Seeley.

The bakery building carries both historic and personal significance. It once doubled as the residence and office of Katherine Morey, who was the long-time Onondaga Town Clerk, and was home to the Seeley family for 10 years. • Long-Term Lease Finalized with County Sheriff's – South Station! Our ability to negotiate this long-term contract reinforces the strength of the collaborative relationship that Town officials and Sheriff's Department leaders have developed over the past several years. The agreement ensures a police presence in our Town for the foreseeable future - which is invaluable to residents' public safety.

The Town Board and Town Supervisor John Mahar helped coordinate and hosted the first Velasko Village & Bellevue Estates Neighborhood Watch Meeting at Town Hall. Local residents heard from Rich McCarron, County Legislator and Vice Chair of the Legislature's Public Safety Committee (former Police Sergeant with the County Sheriff's Dept.); Pam DeGeoff, former Supervisor, Onondaga County Emergency Communications; and Neighborhood Watch Liaison Donna Maycumber about area crime trends and prevention tips.

We have seen a large uptick in calls to Town Hall reporting these issues from individuals who did not contact law enforcement to report specific incidents. Our Town Supervisor meets regularly with the commander of the Onondaga County Sheriff's Dept. located at Town Hall to get updates on their efforts to combat crime in the Town but law enforcement is not our role. Always call 911 when you see something illegal happening.

From Richard McCarron, 11th District, Onondaga County Legislator

It's hard to believe summer is almost over and what is hopefully a beautiful fall is on the horizon. One of the best things about our area is we get to enjoy the vibrant colors the leaves on our trees turn this time of year.



Public Safety

As Vice Chair of the Legislature's Public Safety Committee and a retired Onondaga County Sheriff's Deputy, public safety is of utmost importance to me. I'm happy to report that the Legislature has approved a twenty-year lease agreement between Onondaga County and the Town of Onondaga to operate the Onondaga County Sheriff's Office substation at the Onondaga Town Hall for another 20 years. This is a big win for us, as the town will continue to enjoy the benefits of having a 'local' police department without all the associated costs to the taxpayers within the Town. For the County, it allows the Sheriff's Office to have a central location from which they can patrol the southern towns in Onondaga County.

Through the committee, the county also accepted state funding to support enhanced youth justice alternatives and diversion services, to expand access to mental health programming, and to hire a school-based Threat Assessment Coordinator to help prevent a tragedy in our schools. We also led the way in approving plans to honor two fallen heroes at the county's Emergency Operations Center in Liverpool. The center will be named in honor of Onondaga County Sheriff's Office Lieutenant Michael Hoosock and a 'Wall of Heroes' will be created to remember fallen first responders and it will bear Syracuse Police Officer Michael Jensen's name. This is a fitting tribute as we must always remember their service and sacrifice.

Flood Mitigation Equipment

The Legislature also approved an agreement with New York State to house and deploy state-owned flood mitigation equipment. We all know the problems melting snow and thunderstorms can create, and with this equipment housed locally, it will be available to our first responders faster in times of flooding. The equipment includes pumps, hoses, sandbags, generators and more.

We're lucky to have Onondaga Community College as our neighbor. The Legislature approved its operating budget for 2025-2026, in which OCC requested no increase in county funding and a modest 2% increase in tuition. Even with that, OCC will still be one of the most affordable of all the community colleges in the State. Funds were also approved to help OCC with renovations and upgrades to move them successfully into the future - with more degree programs than ever before.

Job Opportunities

If you're looking for work, consider Onondaga County. The Legislature approved an expansion of the state's Hiring Emergency Limited Placement Program, or HELP Program, which allows the hiring of employees on a probationary basis without the requirement of a civil service test. After one year, those employees are considered permanent and do not have to take the civil service test to remain in the position. About one third of all county job titles now fall under this program, and they vary across many different departments. To see all available jobs, visit Onondaga. gov/Employment.

Community Events

Over the past few months, I've enjoyed seeing many of you at some great community events, including the Middle Eastern Festival at St Elias Church, Southwood Fire Department's Chicken Dinner, Taunton Fire Department's Community Night and the Navarino Orchards Strawberry Festival! Please consider joining me on Saturday, September 20th for this year's ON Farm Fest. This annual event connects the community with the 570+ farms in our county and encourages us to buy local. Here's something you might not have known: agriculture contributes \$350 million to our county's economy every year! Many of the 11 participating farms are close to us. Learn more at OnondagaGrown.com/ONFarmFest. I am also excited to announce that I will be a judge for Southwood Fire Department's first ever Chili Cook Off Contest on October 4th! You can find out more on their Facebook page!

From the Tax Receiver's Office

2025-26 School Tax Collection

School tax bills will be mailed August 27th. Collection begins Tuesday, September 2nd.

The 2025-26 School Tax Collection Penalty Schedule is as follows:

September 2 – October 1 = No penalty/interest

October 2 - October 31 = 2% fee

November 1 – November 15 = 5% fee payable to the Onondaga County Office of Real Property.

After November 15, the outstanding balance will be included in 2025 Town/County property tax bills.

Reminders:

- · We use online banking, which means payments are deposited the same day they are received, several times throughout the day. Therefore, please be sure funds are deposited in your account before writing a check to the Tax Receiver.
- · There is a \$20 fee for returned checks along with other applicable penalties.
- · Always include a phone number on your check in case we need to contact you. This can help you avoid paying unnecessary penalties.
- · We strictly adhere to the rule that no payment is considered as "received" until it can be deposited to the bank. We will return checks to payees that are post-dated, unsigned, and with digit and written amounts that differ.
- · Don't wait till the last minute to pay! Too often checks must be returned due to errors, resulting in penalties.

New Pomeroy Roadside Marker


The William G. Pomeroy Foundation recently approved a grant for a new roadside marker to be placed in South Onondaga.

The Bakeman Family began their story in NYS when Henry Bakeman, who was listed as "colored", moved to Stone Arabia, New York, with his father Jacob from Rocky Hill, New Jersey in 1765. Henry enlisted in the Revolutionary Army at the age of 16, serving with Colonel Marinus Willett, his unit facing the task of taking back Fort Ontario, in Oswego, from the British forces in 1783. Henry was discharged from the Army at Poughkeepsie in February 1784. He married a woman named Jane or "Jinny" and they had son Benjamin in 1794, born in Montgomery County. Henry apparently remembered the potential water power in the area of the Oswego River and returned to the area with his family in 1801. While living in "Bakeman Landing" in what became the city of Fulton, NY, they had four more children.

Benjamin Bakeman found his way to South Onondaga and married Rachel Day. He purchased acreage in Lots 144 and 145 in 1828 to begin his life as a South Onondaga farmer. There was intermarriage over three generations amongst the Day (or the Dey), the Ray, the DeGroat, and the Bakeman Families, all of whom had their origins in New Jersey where they were descendants of the original people enslaved by the Dutch in New Amsterdam. These families traveled to South Onondaga and made their homes there, becoming part of a cooperative farming community. One descendant of the Days was Marjorie Day Carter, who was the first Black teacher in the Syracuse City School District.

Benjamin and Rachel raised a large family of children including Merinda, Oliver, Artemus, Louisa and Charity. Oliver married Sarah DeGroat, who was Native American. The couple had a large family including a son named Willard. In 1904, Willard married Florence Mathewson, in spite of the age difference; Willard was 42, Florence 16. Living on a farm at Card's Corners in the Town of Onondaga, Willard and Florence had a family of nine including a son they, too, named Willard. This Willard Bakeman married Mary Hallinan, the family who farmed land on Howlett Hill Road which today is the site of the Hallinan Meadows Housing Development. Their daughters, Barbara Bakeman Fero and Jo Anne Bakeman, provided the information for this article and were the shakers and movers behind the acquisition of this sign.

After decades of hard work farming and raising a family, Benjamin and Rachel Bakeman found their final resting place in the South Onondaga Cemetery, having been a part of the South Onondaga community for over 50 years.

CADET Youth Program to Again be Offered

The Howlett Hill Fire Department is pleased to announce we will once again be offering a Youth/Cadet Fire Fighting program at our Fire Station.

The Cadet program is an opportunity for young people to be exposed to the many aspects of firefighting and EMS services. Our Department has run similar programs for decades and many of our current members trace the beginning of their own membership back to their participation with our previous youth groups.

The program teaches and exposes the Cadets to as many functions and aspects of firefighting and EMS services as we can safely allow. This includes handling fire hoses, wearing SCBA units, learning how to search smoky buildings (safe imitation smoke), EMS and CPR training, simple auto extrication training, and more. HHFD Members, along with outside professional training instructors, will lead the training sessions.

It is not all work and no play. There are social events, Christmas parties and other activities to round out the program and make it fun for all participants.

The Program will be offered to high school students who are at least 14 years old and in the 9th grade, at a minimum. The Cadet program is designed for youths between the ages of 14 to 16. When the Cadet reaches age 16, they can join the Fire Department and become a Restricted Access Member (RAM) and actually ride on the apparatus and take part in emergency calls.

The Fire Department will host an open house for all interested participants and their parents or guardians at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, September 25 at our Fire Station (3384 Howlett Hill Road).

If you or your teen want to be involved in hands-on learning in this life-saving vocation, please consider joining the HHFD team.

Cadets are not placed in unsafe or hostile environments and any simulations they would take part in are tightly controlled for safety. Cadets will learn donning and doffing of personal protective gear, practice entering smokey rooms, connecting to fire hydrants, aiming a fire hose and how a building sprinkler system works, among other training.

Please watch for fliers, visit and follow our Facebook page (howletthillfiredepartment – 100% volunteer) and discuss this opportunity with your teen.

There is NO COST for involvement in the program. The HHFD provides all equipment and all participants are completely insured. Training classes are typically one night a week for two hours.

We have been busy all year long holding training sessions and classes at our Fire Station.

Original EMT and Refresher Classes. The HHFD hosted an Original Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) class and Refresher class that started in January and ran through May. We had one member enrolled in the full course and five members enrolled in the refresher portion of the class. At the time this article was written, three members completed and passed the refresher class and are now recertified as NYS EMTs.

The HHFD has invested in a set of specialized lifting jacks (Res-Q-Jack) that have the ability to lift heavy vehicles. The Fire Department was lucky to have the inventor of the product come to our Fire Station in May and teach an in-depth hands on course on how to use the jacks. About a dozen members of the HHFD spent the better part of a Saturday learning how to use these highly specialized lifesaving tools. Other Fire Departments in the area that have the same brand of jacks (Spafford and Marcellus FDs) attended as well. The HHFD will be training again in July to refresh these newly learned skills.

CPR/AED training. We are extremely fortunate to have one of our own members qualified to teach CPR. Millie Dordal-Gale recently completed the CRP instructor class and is able to teach our own members CPP/AED. The HHFD requires ALL members to be certified in CPR-Defibrillator, and it was nice that all members were able to get this training in-house this year. We are grateful to Millie for taking the time out of her schedule to become certified to become a CPR instructor.

ALL Howlett Hill Fire Department vehicles and Fire Chief cars carry external defibrillators which are also known as AEDs. We are very proud of our cardiac arrest "save" rate that we have in our community.

In the last few years, PESH, which stands for Public Employee Safety and Health, has been talking about changing the training requirements for Chief Officers in the Fire Service. These changes would require Fire Chiefs to have additional classes and certifications to be eligible to be Fire Chiefs. These changes would have significant effects on our Fire Department if we weren't prepared for them. PESH is OSHA for public employees

and the Volunteer Fire Fighters fall into this category. In an effort to get ahead of any potential future changes, the Chief Officers at the Howlett Hill Fire Department, along with the Junior Officers, have been taking in-house Officer Leadership courses taught by local and highly respected certified instructor, Bill Mitson from Emergency Training Consultants. So far, all our Chiefs, the Captain and other senior members have taken the and completed the curriculum for the Fire Officer 1 and Fire Officer 2 classes. We are taking the summer off and expect to take the Fire Officer 3 course in the fall. The Leadership of the Howlett Hill Fire Department is doing all they can to be ready in the event that these changes do happen so that we can continue to meet our obligation to our community.







Building for the Future Workforce at OCC

The future home of the new Diesel/Heavy Equipment Repair program is being added on to the Whitney Applied Technology Center near the roundabout on the OCC campus.

OCC's commitment to educating the workforce of tomorrow can be seen in major construction projects across campus.

On the east side in the Whitney Applied Technology Center, construction continues on facilities for new academic programs in Diesel/Heavy

Equipment Repair, Welding, HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning), and CNC (Computer Numerical Control) Machining. The Micron Cleanroom Simulation Lab is also progressing through the summer. The construction in the Whitney building is expected to be completed by the beginning of the fall 2025 semester.

On the west side of campus in Ferrante Hall, a complete renovation of all of the spaces where students are prepared for rewarding Health-related careers is underway. Current efforts are focused on the first floor and will eventually move up to the second floor. The work is expected to be completed sometime in 2026.



Traditional classrooms are being demolished in Ferrante Hall to make room for Healthrelated learning spaces which will replicate the workplaces where those services will be provided.

Our Cover Story: Happy Vigentennial Town Hall!


Or as we prefer to say, Happy 20th Anniversary Town Hall. Yes, it's true. It's been two decades since the ribbon was cut and the doors opened at 5020 Ball Road.

Since 2005, the facility has offered residents a one-stop for many town services - all on one level. It is home to the offices of our Clerk, Assessor, Tax Receiver, Supervisor, and Building & Codes Department as well as our Justice Court, Town Board Meeting Room, Historical Society office and museum, community room and the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department – South Station. It offers ample parking to the public, and handicapped accessibility.

And while that may not sound exciting to some, the history of the former Town Hall building is a necessary point of reference.

For those not in the know, the former Town Hall was situated on West Seneca Turnpike atop Onondaga Hill near to where Byrne Dairy stands today. The site was the location of Onondaga County's very first courthouse – which moved to Syracuse in 1830 - and was then used as a school. It was torn down and the new four-room District #6 school was built in 1890 using stone from the original foundation. The school operated there until 1953. The Town of Onondaga purchased the building that same year for \$15,000 and it was dedicated as the official Town Hall on September 25, 1954.

Current Town Councilor Lisa Goodwin worked at the former site and remembers the building as drafty and the windows creaking; birds in the courtroom; lots of mice; and a dirt floor basement with inadequate room for storage. Other employees remember having to cut through the tax receiver's and assessor's offices to access the tiny lunchroom where a table could be pulled down from the wall and with just enough room to squeeze a few chairs around it. They also said bathrooms and the courtroom, board room and supervisor's office were located on the second floor and there was no elevator or handicapped accessibility.

Former Town Supervisor Tom Andino recalled that Sheriffs would have to clear the stairway when leading prisoners up the narrow stairway to the second-floor courtroom and the Town Judge would have to go to the first floor for Court proceedings for individuals who were handicapped or had mobility issues.

The building had even started to lean to the side and was being held up, in part, by steel cables.


So, when New York State ordered the demolition of the Town Hall to allow for the widening and realignment of Velasko Road, it was met with mixed reactions. The building certainly served school children and the public well for its 125+ years. Yet, the Town population had increased significantly and the limitations of the building were obvious. The new facility was built – without debt – and today provides residents with easier, safer access to government services; ADA-compliance; room for community activities; and a healthier, more pleasant working environment for employees.

If you look closely though, you will see that both the "new" Town Hall and the Byrne Dairy on Seneca Turnpike, pay homage to that historic structure via their distinctive clock towers. Likewise, the Town logo continues to pay homage to the past while embracing the now. The iconic clock tower of the original building is also incorporated to the design of the lobby via tiling.

In 2022 the building was dedicated to former Supervisor Andino in gratitude for his 30 years of service to the Town. A time capsule containing Town-related regalia from 1798 to 1998 is buried at the front of Town Hall to be opened in 2048. A War Memorial is also located at the front of Town Hall honoring local veterans and a bench dedicated to long-time Town Justice Bill Rose stands near the front door.

So, if you haven't been to Town Hall lately, stop by and check it out in celebration of its Vigentennial – i.e. 20^{th} - year.

Parks Facilities

The Town operates four beautiful parks for residents. Please be aware that dogs are not allowed in our parks along with smoking of any materials. Reservations for courts, fields, and pavilions require a permit and are available at the Parks office or online at parks. townofonondaga.gov. Permit forms have a list of all fees and rules. Permits must be submitted AT LEAST one week in advance, and no refunds are issued for inclement weather. Groups of 15 or more MUST have a permit. Parks are closed November 1 through April 30.

Kellev Brothers Memorial Park – 99 Kellev Park Dr., Nedrow, NY 13120

This 15-acre park has a rentable pavilion with an accessible walkway and large grill. The park has a restroom, play areas, tennis court, basketball court, and beach volleyball court. There is a pavilion (not rentable) near the playground to provide shade and picnic seating for the families that utilize the play area. The maximum occupancy for permits is 75.

King Memorial Park - 4030 Solit Rock Road, Camillus, NY 13031

The athletic fields are used by our adult softball leagues during the week, with WOYSA playing games on Saturdays in the Spring and Fall. This 20-acre park has two softball fields, a beach volleyball court, two tennis courts, a basketball court, two pickleball courts, grills, two pavilions, playground equipment, and restrooms. The small pavilion near the playground is to provide shade and picnic seating for the families that utilize the play area. The bigger pavilion in the front of the park is rentable. The maximum occupancy for permits is 100.

Howlett Hill Park - 5051 Youth Center Road, Camillus, NY 13031

Adult softball games are held on weeknights along with WOYSA holding soccer games on Saturdays in the spring and fall. This nine-acre park has two softball fields, a tennis court, a basketball court, a pavilion, grills, playground equipment, and restrooms. The maximum occupancy for permits is 75.

Anthony J. Santaro Memorial Park - 4979 Velasko Road. Syracuse, NY 13215

This 22-acre park is a major site for WOYSA, Blue Wave & Outlaws Lacrosse, Westhill and Onondaga Community College athletic teams. There are playground pieces for children two- to five-years-old, as well as a play piece for older children. The blue shade shelter, adjacent to the play areas, is for the use of all park participants, providing shade and picnic seating. It is not reserved for groups - only the upper pavilion is available by permit. Two large grills are adjacent to the upper pavilion. The park also has pickleball courts, tennis courts, a tennis wall, and a basketball court. Tikes 'n Bikes Santaro Town provides a safe, fenced-in area for in-line skating and children with big wheel-type rider toys, tricycles, and small bikes with training wheels. The maximum occupancy for permits is 150.

PARK SECURITY

Our Town parks are routinely patrolled by our staff and the Onondaga County Sheriff's Department, as well as monitored by security cameras. If you have an emergency, call 911. We have seen a rise in vandalism and general disregard for the facilities including excessive trash, unsupervised children in restrooms and improper use of park property. These things lead to additional time and money spent on repairs or even cancellation of activities and park permits. We need your help to keep Town parks beautiful. You are urged to call 911 to report any suspicious activity. All reports are anonymous. Park ordinances are strictly enforced with appearance tickets.
